Model A Yearly Service and Safety Checks

Here are some of the standard safety checks and service that I do during the winter on my A.

- Grease all zerks using Red 'n' Tacky grease
- Change oil (I use 10w 30 but everyone has their own preferences)
- Change differential oil and transmission oil (One quart of 600W should do both)
- Check timing with timing gear and check point gap (I set my points to 0.02)
- Pack front wheel bearings and check brake drums for scoring and brake shoes. Should not be at level with the rivets. This is a good time to adjust the brake wedges and rods if need be.
- Check steering for play. Service Bulletins say there should 1 an inch of play. The Les Andrews Red Book does a good job explaining how to adjust the steering for the 2-Tooth steering.
- Check all light bulbs and horn for safety.
- Check that all cotter pins and clevis pins are in place!! This is one of the most important safety checks in my opinion and one that should be done throughout the year.
- Inspect tires for any cracks in the walls or worn tread.

All of these checks and inspections are a great way to prevent any unwanted roadside seminars as most of these will address any issues.

To the right is a QR code to one of my preferred lubrication charts. I print this off every time I grease my zerks so I can cross them off as I go.



Stepping Out in Style: Distinguishing the Model "A" Era Lady's Shoe Heel

Now more than ever, Model A era reproduction shoes for ladies are readily available at our favorite stores. Nostalgic fashion modes arose after a series of Depression-era films, such as The Artist (2011), The Great Gatsby (2013), Boardwalk Empire (2010-2014), and Downton Abbey (2010-2015), encouraged a new generation of vintage fashion enthusiasts. In the wave of these films, access to reproduction wear increased. Retailers specializing in vintage fashions are popping up in the U.S. and Europe. Companies such as American Duchess (the images to the right, taken from their website, illustrates their historical accuracy), Miss L. Fire, and dance shoe companies offer era-correct shoes. However, each era fashion enthusiast must do his or her own research to vet each fashion purchase. This article focuses on recognizing Model A era shoe heels and matching heel height to the complementary dress-hem length.





Many of us recognize the typical Ladies' Model A era shoe; however, distinguishing the "competition worthy" heel may be more difficult. Modern ladies' shoes may have "the look" of our era; however, the heel is not always accurate. For instance, the figure to the left shows a shoe currently available by a major manufacturer. Its tall,

rectangular heel is significantly dissimilar to the Model A era heels illustrated in the right

figure found in the MAFCA Fashion Guidelines. While the top portion of this pair conforms to the era's T-Strap appearance, wearing them in a competitive venue will result in points lost. If you purchase a pair of modern shoes with an era look but without the era heel, wearing them for fun is always an option.

Model A's in the Snow

You know you wish you could

This 1930 Ford Model 68B cabriolet convertible couple is an extremely scarce Montana mail carrier car ready to find a home in a private collection or museum. The car is one of two custom-built in Glendive, Montana in 1941 in order to maneuver in deep snow drifts. The oversized wide tires accomplished floatation and enabled the mail car to drive over deep snow. Much special work went into modifying the fenders and chassis to fit the 24" rims with 11.2" X 24" Goodyear diamond tread tractor tires. The car uses a Model TT truck differential which is geared lower to work with the oversized tires.









A number of conversions existed to alter a Ford car into a commercial vehicle. Kits could make them into tractors or fire equipment or even snowmobiles. Surprisingly popular in snowy regions, these conversions are most associated the Model T. Though much rarer, there were several companies offering Model A conversions. By adding Caterpillar type tracks to the rear drive and skis at the front you could make a surprisingly capable snow machine from a standard Ford.

This example is quite elaborate with its two additional axles to support the tracks. The ability to use the skis with the front wheels is also an uncommon feature. Clearly a well-built machine for serious use. It looks to have had a more recent utility back fitted but seems a largely original and unmodified machine. It is more than likely equipped with an accessory gear box to allow for the low gearing necessary to drive through the snow.

Today a hardy group of enthusiasts regularly use these Ford snowmobiles and they have proven to be great fun and very capable vehicles. This unusual and well-made example is rare survivor. It could be great fun to recommission and enjoy in some fresh snow.



2025 January Tech Session - Removal and Installation of a Model A Engine By: Jarrod Williams

I was blown away by the interest, but most of by all the help that our club showed! I can not thank everyone enough for coming over to help, watch, make fun of me, laugh, and just enjoy working on a Model A. We removed my Model A engine, then I checked the bearing clearances, and adjusted the valves. After that I replaced the 5.5:1 high compression head with a stock Model A head. Then I removed the lightened flywheel, V8 pressure plate, and clutch. All of those were replaced with a stock Model A flywheel, stock pressure plate, and stock clutch. Why in the world did I do this, you may ask. Well, it is winter and I like to tinker. I want to have a direct comparison of those non-stock goodies to the stock ones. With the promise of help from the John and the club it was a no brainer to take on. The tools needed for the removal and installation of the engine are available to every paying member of our club from the tool crib. The engine hoist, engine stand, and the water pump engine stand attachment are all available to use! This is what the club is all about! I am so proud of us.

The Ahoogah Origin

The ahooguh horn, also known as a Klaxon horn was developed and patented by Miller Reese Hutchison, an inventor of the early 20th century. Hutch, as he was known, patented the mechanism in 1908. The LovellMcConnell Manufacturing Company of Newark, New Jersey bought the rights to manufacture the device and it later became standard equipment on motor cars.

Franklyn Hallett Lovell Jr., the company founder, coined the name klaxon from the Ancient Greek verb klazō, meaning shriek. Klaxon horns produce an easily identifiable sound, often described in English as "ahooguh". Like most mechanical horns, the klaxon has largely been replaced by solidstate electronic devises, though the memorable tone has persisted on in classic cars of the era. Klaxon later became a brand name.

The Klaxon horn was used on U.S. submarines during WWII. The Klaxon horn's characteristic sound is produced by a springsteel diaphragm with a rivet in the center that is repeatedly struck by the teeth of a rotating cogwheel. The diaphragm

is attached to a horn that acts as an acoustic transformer and controls the direction of the sound. In the first Klaxons, the wheel was driven either by hand or by an electric motor.

Hutchison went to work for Thomas Edison in 1909, and was the chief engineer for Edison from 1912 to 1918.

The ahooguh sound is usually heard today when a Model A Ford goes rolling down the road.
