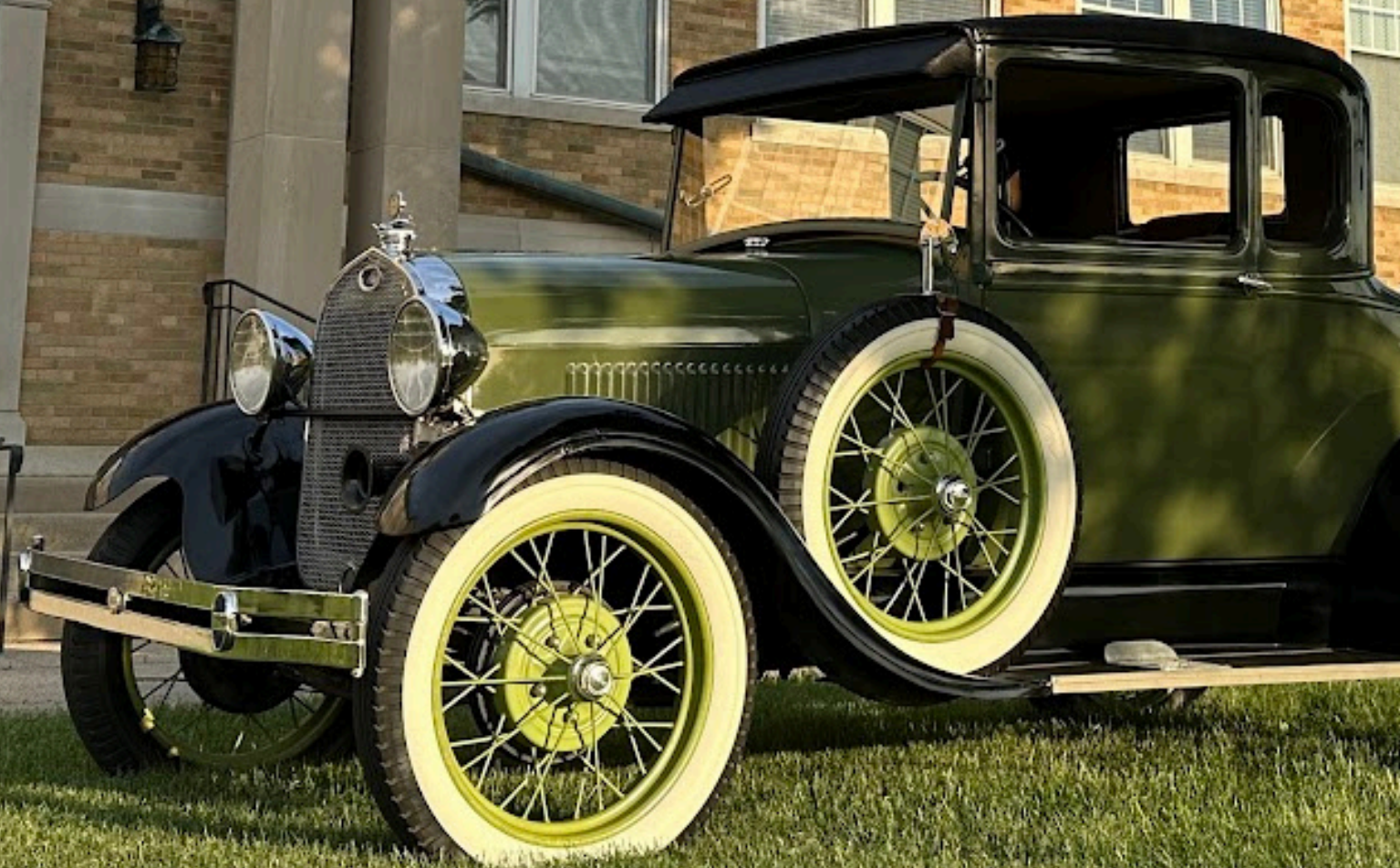

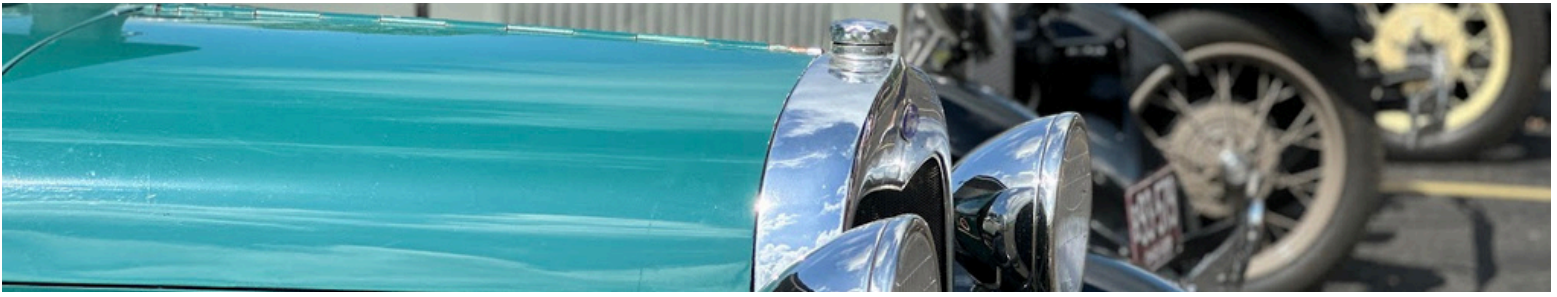

Modified Zenith

The Zenith carburetor shown in the following series of photos has been extensively modified. It is reported that the purpose of the modification is to provide equalized air venting when some type of air cleaner is attached to the carburetor. The theory is that with the modification the air pressure in the fuel reservoir will then be the same as the air pressure behind the air cleaner. There is a theory that adding an air cleaner to an unmodified carburetor will cause the car to run rich because of the imbalance of air pressure.



Note the slot milled into the casting right above the secondary well (threaded hole) located on the left. A hole has also been drilled into the casting in the forward area of where the venturi installs. The hole goes through to the throat of the carburetor where air is introduced. The two original vent holes on the right have been plugged off with a threaded brass plug.

The venturi has been machined to create a groove around its circumference to allow the air coming through the drilled hole to continue to the fuel reservoir.

Note how the venturi with the groove machined in it accommodates the slot of the milled casting and allows air to pass around it. The brass plug on the right is long enough to also plug off the 1/8" vent hole that was added to the later castings.

Note the secondary well installed on the left has had the top slightly milled so that the top is below the bottom of the slot milled into the casting.

The Model A Ford was not delivered with an air cleaner. The carburetor on a Model A is an updraft and is fed fuel by gravity from the fuel tank that is located above it. Carburetors on a Model A can and will leak fuel occasionally for a number of reasons including faulty tank valves and float valves. If an air cleaner is attached with a paper or foam filter it could become soaked in fuel and should there be a backfire on starting, there could possibly be a fire.

In our efforts to accomplish these goals we strive to provide information and benefits to all of our club members. Some of these benefits include the following:

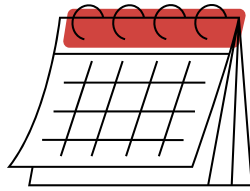

THE running BOARD REPORT

Much of the time spent at Board meetings involves the financials of your club. Expenses continuously rise and we are constantly looking for ways to cut or eliminate costs to you. To that end, your Board of Directors has voted (unanimously) to sell the office building in Garden City, Michigan. We have no plans to occupy another space at this time, but the building has been virtually vacant for several years with no changes predicted for the foreseeable future. The contents are safely stored and monies will be placed in an interest bearing account separate from our general treasury.

Are you aware that if your club is a "mixed" region of MARC members, MAFCA members and members with no affiliation that ONLY members of MARC are covered by our liability insurance? Region members with no MARC membership number cannot be considered part of MARC and therefore are not covered. While it's true that liability lawsuits are rare and unlikely, costs can be in the millions of dollars if you're sued and lose. MARC is proud to guarantee coverage to all its dues paying members as part of their payment. Speak with your non-MARC members soon and advise them of one of the benefits of MARC membership—the generous liability insurance program!

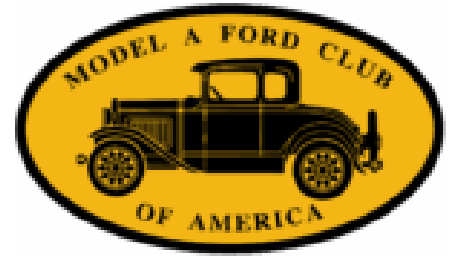
REMEMBER to make mid-season adjustments to your brakes, timing, and fluids. If you haven't greased the chassis in a couple of years, take advantage of the next nice day and spend some time with the undercarriage of your favorite car or truck (your Model A, of course!), and get those fittings cleaned and lubricated for the rest of the season. While you're there, check for rusted or missing cotter pins, corroded electrical connections (battery ground, stoplight switch) and oil drips from engine, transmission or rear axle. Your car will appreciate it!

COMPATIBILITY with today's traffic can be a daunting task while driving a Model A. For the safety of you and your passengers, why not consider installing seat belts and directional signals if you haven't done so already—if you have, offer to help a fellow club member with their installation. The LED lighting systems are easy to install, are reasonably priced from our advertised vendors, and could save your life! Of course, seat belts are also life savers, but will need to be custom installed.

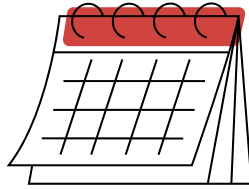
The MAFCA Story

The club traces its origins to October 1955, when a small group of Model A Ford enthusiasts from the Los Angeles area came together to form a social club for Model A owners in Southern California. Initially named the Model A Restorers Club of Southern California, its activities were focused on the Los Angeles region. On September 23, 1957, the club was officially founded as the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA) in Glendale, California, and was incorporated on October 21, 1957.

The launch of its publication, *The Restorer*, in May 1956 helped the club gain nationwide recognition. As the magazine grew in popularity, the club expanded beyond Southern California and took on a national presence. In 1957, it was reorganized and renamed, allowing other Model A clubs to join as affiliated chapters. Since then, MAFCA has chartered over 250 chapters across the United States and internationally.

Today, the MAFCA is the world's largest car club dedicated to a single automobile make. As a nonprofit organization, MAFCA is committed to the restoration and preservation of the Model A Ford. Membership is open to anyone with a genuine interest in these objectives and who meets the qualifications outlined in the club's By-Laws.

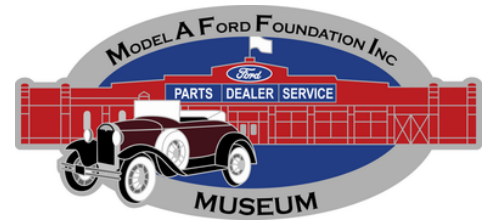

The MAFFI Story

The Model A Ford Foundation, Inc. (MAFFI) began in December 1986 when Model A Ford Club of America Board Members formed the organization to preserve the history of Model A cars and related artifacts.

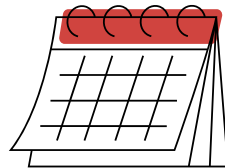
Approved as a California organization in February 1987 and a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) in June 1987, the foundation's activities focus on research, archiving, and operating The Model A Ford Museum at the Gilmore Car Museum in Michigan, which opened in May 2013.

Every year, the third Saturday and Sunday of September, the museum hosts the renowned "Model A Days" event. This is a two day event held at the only museum dedicated to the Model A in the United States. Join in the swap meet, Hall of Fame induction ceremony, car show, tech seminars, and the famous "first-start" of a barn find are just some of the things you can do.

In 2025, the museum proudly finished a massive \$1.2M expansion that doubled the size of the museum and included a "learning" garage area where tech seminars will be held.

Future generations will be able to enjoy the history and fun of the Model A for years to come.

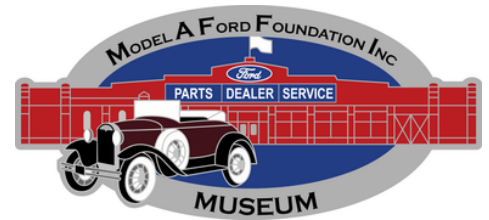

The project began when Ron Jennings donated a 1930 Ford Model A Town Sedan to MAFFI, and the Evergreen Chapter volunteered to restore it. A team of experienced club members undertook a full frame-off restoration. The body was removed from the frame, the original wood structure was replaced with a complete new wood kit, and extensive bodywork was completed before the car received fresh base-coat and clear-coat paint. The engine, transmission, and rear end were fully rebuilt, including new babbitt bearings, re-bored cylinders with new pistons and rings, a performance camshaft, and modern valves with hardened seats. The final assembly included a new top, new glass, and high-quality upholstery, completing the car's polished appearance.

All labor and parts for the restoration were donated by Evergreen Chapter members. After a successful test drive, the finished car was proudly presented to MAFFI at the 2014 MAFCA National Convention in Puyallup, Washington, where the keys were formally handed to MAFFI President Stan Johnson. The car was then transported to the MAFFI Museum in Hickory Corners, Michigan, where it remains on display today as a testament to the craftsmanship and dedication of the club members who restored it.

YOUTH AND SCHOLARSHIP

MODEL A YOUTH RESTORATION AWARD



The MAYRA Story

When MAYRA began in 1994, one requirement was that the youth, his or her parents, or grandparents had to be members of MAFCA. The award would be made biennially at an MAFCA National Convention. The Dallas Model A Ford Club stepped up to the plate and donated \$500 for the first award. The Dallas club has continued with its support for every future award.

Over the years, as the program became widely known, more and more youth applied. The program was later endorsed by the Model A Restorers Club (MARC) and youth associated were able to participate. Today, recipients are announced jointly at the MAFCA and MARC summer national conventions. The early awards were cash payments, but when the program became exempt under IRS Section 501 (C) 3, the awards became gift certificates purchased from Model A parts and services vendors. Prior to 2024, awards were made biennially. Awards are made annually.

Every eligible applicant receives an award equal to that of the other applicants. However, the award amount could be less based on an applicant's needs. The award amounts are established by the Board of Directors and have varied over the years based on donations. In recent years, the award amounts ranged from \$1,300 to \$3,000. MAYRA's program is set up so that a recipient can apply for additional awards as long as they are less than age 22 by May 31 of the year when the awards are made.

MAYRA's program relies on local Model A clubs to seek out and identify youth interested in the Model A hobby. It is generally through these contacts that youth become aware of the program. Additionally, the websites and publications of both national Model A Clubs have information on the program and links through Google search and Facebook.

In an effort to expose as many kids as possible to the Model A Ford, both around the country and abroad, in 2022, MAYRA initiated "May is Model A Youth Month." With the support of both national Model A organizations – MARC and MAFCA – we declared May 2022 as the inaugural Model A Youth Month. Each Model A Club is asked to do an event that provides Model A's hands-on contact with children and teens but encourages moms and dads to attend, too.

We have a good and fair relationship with Model A parts and services vendors whose donations are in the form of gift certificates. When a vendor donates, MAYRA makes an equal purchase of gift certificates. A large number of additional gift certificates are purchased from those vendors based on their donation's percentage of all the vendor donations.

BACKROADS & BULLSEYES



SATURDAY, JUNE 13, 2026

The Rules:

- You must sign a liability waiver for the property owner
 - Jarrod will have at the meeting location, must be signed and dated before we depart
 - Everyone on the tour must sign one, even if you do not plan to shoot a gun
- Must listen and abide by short range safety talk before we shoot
- Jarrod and Chris Lawson are in charge
- Pistols and rifles only, shooting at metal targets or bring your own paper targets
- We will shoot our fill of pistols and then move up hill to the rifle range
- Rifle range will be 125 yards (375ft) with a 17ft drop
- Guns must be unloaded when brought onto the property
- Only 1-2 people will be shooting at any one time.
- When shooting, only load as much ammo as you are going to fire.

The Details:

- This is private property. What Chris Lawson, the property owner, says goes.
- Bathroom access will be property owners home
 - there is a little bit of a walk from the field to the main house
- There is only dirt access to the gun range. If weather permits we might be able to drive the Model A's closer to the gun range. If not there will be a short walk.
- We will start with pistol shooting. Once everyone has had their fill of shooting pistols, we will pack up and move everything to the rifle range.

What to bring:

- Bring your own eye and ear protection (muffs or ear plugs)
- Bring a folding chair
- Sun protection (there is no shade)
- We will have a late lunch on site
 - Hotdogs and or burgers will be grilled out by the property owner.
- John and I will bring chips, but you are welcome to bring other sides to share.
- Bring your own drinks (**NO ALCOHOL at this event. ZERO TOLLERANCE**)
- **Jarrod asks that a small donation of \$10 per person be made for food and use of range**

LAUNDRY IN THE MODEL A ERA

In our car club we talk about the cars and we talk about era clothing, but we do not talk about cleaning our clothing. I have a book written in 1931 about laundering and dry cleaning. The book was published by the Woman's Institute of Domestic Arts and Sciences. After reading this book, I see that laundry is laundry. We still have to sort, wash, dry, iron and fold our clothes. However, during the Model A era, it was a lot of work. The process took the better part of two days and could be downright dangerous. They did not have the conveniences that we have today.

When Is Wash Day?

A famous poem says that Monday is laundry day. The book says that Tuesday was becoming more popular. Monday was the day to prepare for the washday: put the house in order, remove stains, mend and sort the clothes.

Setting Up the Laundry – The Equipment

In most homes the laundry was done in the kitchen or in an adjoining room. Sometimes the laundry was in the basement. No matter which room was used, it needed to be well ventilated, well lit and have access to hot water.

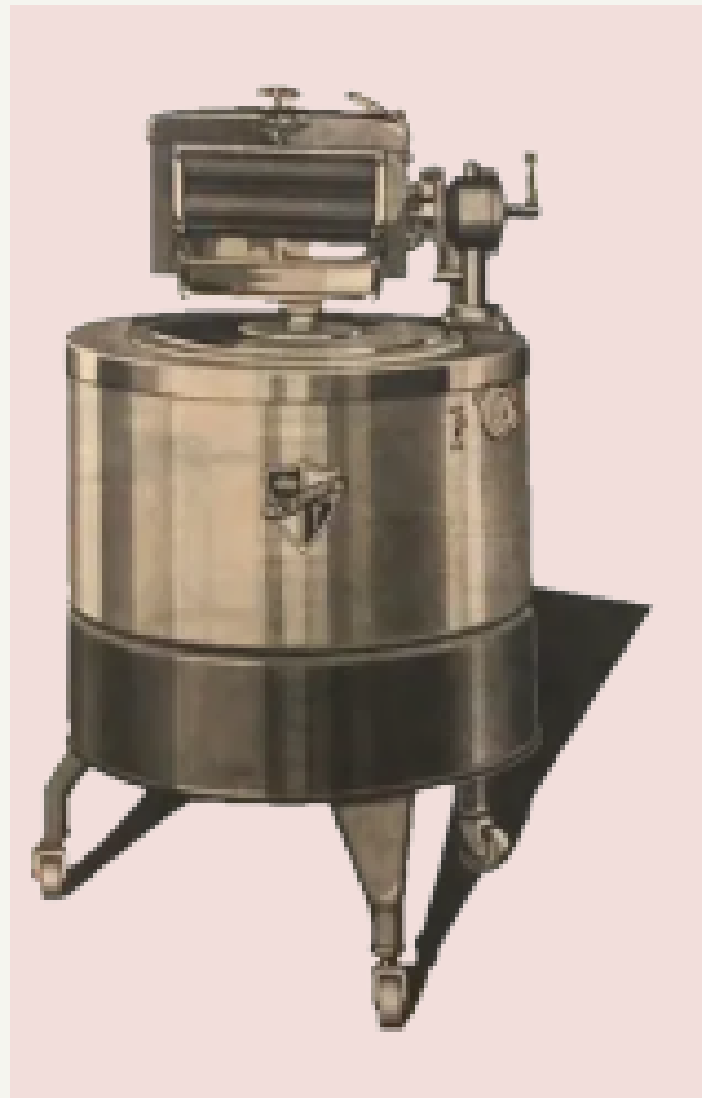

Washing Machines and Tubs

There were several types of washing machines. Basically they were washing tubs with a lid and a device inside to agitate the clothing. They could be cranked by hand or have a motor powered by electricity, gas or water. The 1931 Sears catalog advertised an electric washer for \$50.00 to \$65.00 and a gasoline one for \$89.50. A hand activated machine sold for \$16.00. To put this in perspective, the Model A era was during the Great Depression, when the average annual income was \$1,850.00. That is about \$36.00 a week. I suspect that most homes used the hand cranked model. The wash tub with a wash board was still available, as well as a hand held suction plunger or agitator. The washing machine tubs needed to be cleaned by hand with soap and water. If the tub was copper, a mixture of vinegar, salt and kerosene was used. In our modern era we use a tub cleaning agent and the washer cleans itself.

Soap

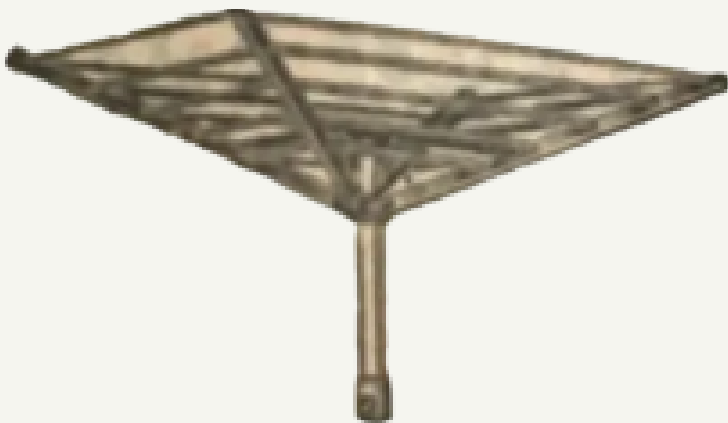
Detergent as we know it today was not invented until 1933. A laundress needed to be a simple chemist. Soap used for laundry needed to be flaked, so that it could be dissolved in water. It could be purchased already flaked.



If flaked soap was not available, bar soap was flaked by using a soap flaker. The picture at left shows a basic hand-cranked soap flaker. The soap was dissolved in hot water and whipped to a foam. Soap jelly could also be made by mixing flakes, water and borax. This mixture was heated on the stove. Soap beads were new on the market in the Model A era. They were supposed to dissolve in water instantly. A laundress also needed to be familiar with bluing, starch, acids, alkalis and how to soften water.

Clothes Washing

After soaking, washing the clothes with soap was the next step. Then, they had to be rinsed two or three times. The washing machines of the era didn't have a rinse cycle. The water would have to be emptied and refilled each time. After washing and between rinses, the clothes were put through a ringer; either electric or hand cranked.



Clothes Drying

For the most part clothes were hung to dry outdoors or inside on racks during inclement weather. There was a clothes dryer patented in 1892, but it basically was a ventilated device that sat on top of a stove with a hand crank. The type of dryer we use today was not sold until 1938.

Irons and Ironing Boards

Ironing boards were similar to the ones we have today. The picture at right shows a typical three-legged board. A sheet of asbestos could be used to hold the hot iron when it was not in use during the ironing process. There were a wide range of irons available. They came in different sizes and were used for different purposes. It was suggested that if only one iron was purchased, it should weigh between six to eight pounds. Regulating the temperature of the iron was also more difficult than it is today.

Irons were heated through different means: gas, electric, gasoline/kerosene and charcoal, or the old fashioned cast-iron model that was heated on the stove. The gas iron is pictured below at left; the electric iron at the right. With all of these types, except for the electric iron, drafts could be a problem because they could fan the flames and cause a fire. The gasoline irons were sold from 1930's through the 1950's. If a house did not have gas or electricity, the self-contained gasoline iron was an alternative.



Steam irons for the home were not available until 1950. In the Model A era, the wrinkles in clothes needed to be removed by other means. After the clothes were dry, they had to be dampened by sprinkling them with water. Then they were rolled up to wait to be ironed.

As we wear our period clothing, especially reproduction and era image, we should be grateful that at the end of the day, that we have more cleaning options and modern technology to more quickly and easily clean our clothes. They will be ready for another day without having to deal with the hazardous and time-consuming process used almost a century ago.

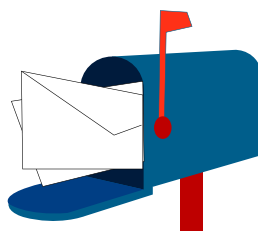
